Welcome and Call to Order, *Chairman Joe Hood*

Chairman Hood called the meeting to order at 2:00 P.M. Ms. Madeline Lara called the roll, and a quorum was confirmed.

Review of Minutes, *Chairman Joe Hood*

Chairman Hood called for a review of the minutes of the June 20, 2023 meeting. Director Ayers made a motion to approve the minutes; Ms. Bunn seconded, and the motion carried without dissent.

Victim Assistance Grants Committee, *Ms. Kristy Carter*

Chairman Hood recognized Ms. Kristy Carter for the purpose of presenting the Victim Assistance Grants committee recommendations of the Victim Assistance Division (VAD) collectively.

The Victim Assistance Grants Committee met on Friday, September 22, 2023. The following synopsis and recommendations were made for your review and consideration. FFY23 Victims of Crime Act Assistance (VOCA) Formula Grant Program

Total Recommendation: \$35,000,000

Please see attached FY2023 VOCA Competitive Funding Opportunity Summary for full report.

Ms. Carter reported that the Victim Assistance Division received the FFY23 VOCA Assistance allocation on March 28, 2023 in the amount of \$41,192,820 for grant programs. As the chart above illustrates, if \$35M in award recommendations are approved, CJCC will retain a balance of \$32,661,495. OVC provided updated projections at the VOCA conference in August of 2023. OVC stated that States should expect at least a 41% reduction from FFY23 levels for FFY24 formula awards. Based on current projections and residual balances, CJCC expects to maintain the \$35M VOCA award level through FFY25.

Due to the significant decline in VOCA funding and not opening funding since 2018, CJCC took a strategic approach and determined that opening VOCA competitively for FY23 would set new award levels for a 3-year grant cycle, while allowing for at least one-year continuation awards for supplemental funds. CJCC is seeking to provide organizations with new VOCA award information that would allow them to plan accordingly, and to continue their efforts to diversify funding while supplemental funding is available. The recommendations presented would meet award allocation requirements and allow CJCC to reserve funding as we plan for continuation cycles in FY24 and FY25.

The Victim Assistance Division will continue to apply for supplemental and discretionary funding to support programs and victims of crime as states wait for additional support from the federal level and the Crime Victims Fund (CVF) balance to rebound as criminal settlements from federal non-prosecution and deferred prosecution agreements are deposited into the CVF.

State and Local Fiscal Recovery Act ARPA Victim Service Provider Grant Program

Total Recommendation: \$26,580,924

Continuing, Ms. Carter reported that the ARPA Victim Service Provider Grant Program award totaled \$55M through September 30, 2025. This program supports nonprofits that are 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(19) tax-exempt organizations and validated by the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council as a victim service provider. The economic harms incurred by victim service providers as a result of COVID-19 have only increased as crime rates in Georgia continue to rise, causing more victimized adults and children to seek services, and as courts open to address the backlog caused by the COVID-19 public health emergency. These victim service providers have faced significant challenges due to the pandemic's increased demand for their very important services and changing operational needs, as well as declines in revenue sources such as donations and fees. The grant program will be available through the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds provided in the ARPA legislation.

Eligibility

501(c)(3) or 501(c)(19) tax-exempt organizations and validated by the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council as a victim service provider that can demonstrate:

- Decreased revenue (e.g. from donations and fees)
- Financial Insecurity
- Increased costs (e.g. uncompensated increases in service need)
- Capacity to weather financial hardship
- Challenges covering payroll, rent or mortgage, and other operating costs.

Eligible activities may include:

- Supporting payroll and benefits.
- Costs to retain employees (i.e. supplemental pay, hazard pay, etc.)
- Mortgage or rent, utility, and other operating costs.
- Support for COVID 19 prevention and mitigation strategies

CJCC is recommending continuation awards for an additional 12-months to subawardees. Continuation awards were reduced by 1.2% to obligate all remaining ARPA funds. Awards will cover a project period from October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024 but grant funding can be used through September 30, 2025. If recommendations are approved, CJCC will obligate all funds to utilize by September 30, 2025.

Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) Supplemental American Rescue Act Grant Program (Federal funds):

Total Recommendation - \$909,196

Next, Ms. Carter shared that the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) provides the primary federal funding stream dedicated to the support of emergency shelter and supportive services for victims of domestic violence and their dependents. Funded through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP), programs will provide immediate crisis intervention and safety planning services to victims of domestic violence and promote resiliency and healing for children exposed to domestic violence. State administrators and Tribes may use this supplemental funding to establish, maintain, and expand programs and projects to: 1) prevent incidents of family violence, domestic violence, and dating violence; and 2) provide immediate shelter, supportive services, and access to community-based programs for victims of family violence, domestic violence, or dating violence. If recommendations are approved, CJCC will obligate all funds to utilize by September 30, 2025.

Committee Recommendation:

- 1) Staff recommends awarding 65 domestic violence victim service agencies for a total of **\$909,196**. *See Tab M.*

FFY21 Family Violence Prevention and Services Act American Rescue Plan COVID-19 Testing, Vaccines, and Mobile Health Units Access Supplemental Funding:

Total Recommendation: \$2,994,190

Continuing, Ms. Carter reported that in November 2021, CJCC was awarded \$9,688,908 to support domestic violence survivors that may be utilized through September 30, 2025. The purpose of these supplemental funds is to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19 with an intentional focus on increasing access to COVID-19 testing, vaccines, and mobile health units to mitigate the spread of this virus, and increase supports for domestic violence survivors. Within these parameters, grant recipients have flexibility to determine which services best support the needs of survivors, children, and families experiencing family violence, domestic violence, and dating violence.

Methodology

CJCC leveraged supplemental funding for domestic violence serving agencies to apply for funding to address the immediate and emergent needs surrounding COVID-19 mitigation efforts. Agencies were eligible to apply for set allocations listed in the released RFA. CJCC

recommends continuation awards at the same levels. Awards will cover a project period from October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024. CJCC will retain an unallocated balance of \$3,031,700 to utilize by September 30, 2025.

Committee Recommendations:

- 1) Staff recommends funding 53 domestic violence programs for the following activities:
 - Supplemental Pay for Staff Salaries
 - Personal Protective Equipment, Supplies, and Sanitation
 - Wellness Support for Staff
 - Additional Staff Support
 - Client Assistance (food, transportation, housing, relocation assistance, etc.)
 - Covid-19 Rapid Testing Kits
 - Counseling/Therapy Services
 - Legal Assistance Services
 - Vaccine and Testing Outreach

FFY21 Family Violence Prevention and Services (FVPSA) American Rescue Plan (ARP) Grant to Support Survivors of Sexual Assault

Total Recommendation: \$1,693,296

Next, Ms. Carter reported that in November 2021, CJCC was awarded \$4,416,991 to support sexual assault and rape crisis services and supports that may be utilized through September 30, 2025. The purpose of the ARP Grants to Support Survivors of Sexual Assault is to 1) assist with the transition to virtual/remote services for rape crisis centers, sexual assault programs, tribal programs, and culturally specific programs that provide crisis services, support services, and assistance to survivors of sexual assault, and 2) support the increased emergency needs of sexual assault survivors as a result of the COVID-19 public health emergency.

CJCC released the second awards in October 2022 that end September 30, 2023. This is the final release of these supplemental funds. If recommendations are approved, CJCC will have obligated all funds to utilize by September 30, 2025.

Methodology

CJCC leveraged supplemental funding for sexual assault serving agencies to apply for funding to address support the following items:

1. Supplemental pay for direct service staff
2. Items to assist with virtual remote services (laptops, cell phones, Zoom)
3. On-call fees for SANEs and advocates
4. Office supplies
5. Medical supplies
6. Training
7. Client assistance funds
8. Therapy

Committee Recommendations:

- 1) Staff recommends funding 36 sexual assault programs for the following activities:

Sexual Assault-Preventive Health Block Grant (PHBG)

Total Recommendation: \$214,200

Next, Ms. Carter reported that the purpose of the FY23 Preventive Health Block Grant is to provide awareness and education to Georgia's citizens on sexual assault prevention strategies that will change the attitudes of communities regarding nonconsensual sex and violence. Education and awareness activities will be accomplished through the provision of trainings, presentations, technical assistance, community outreach, and collaboration. CJCC received an increase of \$6,594. CJCC staff recommends an increase of \$314 per award.

Committee Recommendation:

- 1) Award the 21 sexual assault centers at award amounts (\$10,200 per subgrant) for a total of **\$214,200**. *See TAB P.*

At the conclusion of her report, Chairman Hood turned to the Council for any questions. Director Clanton was recognized and asked Ms. Carter if there any significance that the Council should note with an application being marked as late. Ms. Carter responded, stating that technical assistance will be provided to the programs that were denied funding either due to issues regarding capacity and governance as well as those whose applications staff felt were better suited for alternative funding opportunities. Ms. Carter also noted that CJCC is looking to implement a new grants management system which will allow for technical issues with applications to be caught earlier in the process. CJCC staff does accept late applications when technical issues have not been identified prior to the deadline; however, in order to maintain fairness, late applications are noted and an award percentage reduction is applied. Applicants are notified of such reduction and are happy to be considered for the award despite their late application.

Chairman Hood asked Ms. Carter to expand upon the anticipated state of the Crime Victims Fund next year given that the supplemental funds that CJCC staff has been able to secure over the past few years have now been expended. Ms. Carter explained that overall support to victim service agencies across the state, we are at an about \$14 million shortfall. Next

year, we anticipate about a \$44 million shortfall because the ARPA funds and other supplemental sources have been expended and our VOCA award is only \$35 million. Unless the VOCA fund rebounds through a congressional step to fix the fund, we anticipate more cuts to funding in the coming year. Chairman Hood thanked Ms. Carter for her explanation and for the work her staff has done throughout the review process when making the award decisions to ensure equitable consideration for each application.

There being no further questions, Chairman Hood turned to the Council members for a motion. Mr. Vignati made a motion to accept the recommendations as presented. Director Ayers seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. It has been noted for the record that Ms. Briones, Commissioner Oliver, Ms. Bunn, and Ms. Duke abstained from voting on any awards for their respective agencies due to a conflict of interest.

Before continuing, Chairman Hood recognized Director Neal who shared with the Council members that the cuts that have been discussed also affect the agency as a whole. The Victims Assistance Division is funded by the 5% administrative allotment from the VOCA funds that CJCC is awarded. A decrease in the award means a decrease in the funds available to support our staff and other programs that we have been able to support in the past. Additionally, the raises that were awarded in the past couple of legislative budgets were not funded for anyone other than state funded employees. To cover those costs for the remaining employees meant that we had to use our VOCA administrative dollars. This has greatly depleted those funds. Moving forward, CJCC will not be able to operate with the same efficiency as we have in the past in order to avoid the burnout of our dedicated staff. Ms. Fillingame thanked Director Neal for bringing this information to the Council's attention and expressed her thanks to Ms. Carter and her team.

Victim Assistance Division Updates

Lastly, Ms. Carter provided the following updates on the Victim Assistance Division to the Council:

CRIME VICTIMS FUND (CVF)

September 14, 2023 update from Kris Rose, OVC Director.

- Month of August deposits: \$30.8 million
- Balance in the fund: \$879 million (reflects obligated state awards)
- \$400 million of deposits needed in September to meet the President's and House and Senate marks for FY 24
- After September, there are still a few more months where OVC can collect more deposits before obligating funding for FY24. OVC remains optimistic that the fund will be able

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The Victim Assistance Division is preparing to release two competitive funding opportunities for the FY23 OVW Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) grant program and the FY23 OVW Sexual Assault Services Program (SASP). The Victim Assistance Division is also preparing to release a non-competitive funding opportunity through a Senator Ossoff supported congressional directed appropriation for domestic violence shelters. VAD plans to call a special

meeting to approve CDS allocation recommendations and present VAWA and SASP recommendations at the November 29, 2023 Victim Assistance Grants Committee Meeting.

OVC AVNS

CJCC is finalizing the state procurement process. CJCC will make the announcement to Council and other stakeholders as soon as the final contract is executed. CJCC would like to thank the Prosecuting Attorneys’ Council of Georgia, State Board of Pardons and Paroles, the Judicial Council of Georgia Administrative Office of the Courts, the Sheriffs’ Association, and Marsy’s Law for Georgia for assisting with proposal reviews. A no-cost extension was granted and CJCC will work with the selected vendor and stakeholders to begin a phased implementation of a statewide automated victim notification system.

Criminal Justice Grants Committee, Mr. Robert Thornton

Chairman Hood recognized Mr. Robert Thornton for the purpose of presenting the Criminal Justice Grants Committee recommendations collectively.

Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (Byrne JAG)

Mr. Thornton began by sharing that the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to the state and local jurisdictions. CJCC will issue a call for Byrne JAG continuation applications with a deadline of October 31, 2023. The below charts list the local and state existing grantees and current funding levels. Staff anticipates most grantees will request the same funding amount for 2024.

- 1) Approval of the 2024 awards based on the 2023 Byrne JAG funding levels. If any grantees request additional funding, staff will address those individual requests at to the next Committee meeting.

Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Grant Program (RSAT)

Total Recommendation: \$1,751,629

Next, Mr. Thornton reported that the Residential Substance Abuse Treatment for State Prisoners (RSAT) Formula Grant assists states and units of local government in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs. Each grantee is required to provide a 25% match on the approved grant award. Earlier this year, CJCC released a request for proposal (RFP) for state and local applicants. Funding requests were received from the Georgia Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) and the Georgia Department of Corrections (GDC), as well as local requests from Clarke County Sheriff’s Office, Divinely Inspired to Victoriously Achieve Success, Incorporated (DIVAS), Forsyth County Sheriff’s Office, Hall County Correctional Institute (HCCI), Newton County Sheriff’s Office, and Washington County Sheriff’s Office. Due to the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, supply chain issues and difficulty hiring have led several RSAT programs to experience delays in program implementation which has subsequently led to delays in spending grant funds. The recommended amounts listed below with an * are

grantees that still have a large amount left on the current grant award. In these cases, staff is seeking the Committee’s approval to allocate the recommended amounts which will be awarded once grantees have been reimbursed for at least 75% of their current awards.

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Committee Recommendation:

- 1) Allocating \$1,751,629 for RSAT awards as listed in the “Amount Recommended” column in the chart above. Of the amount allocated, staff further recommends making awards totaling \$931,260 and setting aside the remaining \$820,369 (denoted with an *) to be awarded once the subgrantee has expended at least 75% their current award.

Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulus, and Substance Abuse Program

Total Recommendation: \$40,826

Continuing, Mr. Thornton reported that the purpose of the FY20 Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Program (COSSAP) naloxone initiative is to provide funding to cover the cost of naloxone kits as well as ongoing law enforcement training in naloxone administration, Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP) implementation standards that commit to reporting, and best practices for engaging with people suffering from opioid addiction.

The Council previously allocated \$528,453 in funds to Savannah-Chatham Board of Commissioners (BOC) for the creation of a community database, and Julota was the selected platform. The initial “hubs” chosen to enter data were Chatham County, Chatham Emergency Management Services, Savannah Police Department, Gateway Community Service Board, and JC Lewis Health. CJCC received a request from Savannah Chatham BOC for a six-month extension and additional funding. The extension would give the county needed time to onboard essential hubs and create aggregate reports to demonstrate the impact of the project. Three additional hubs could be onboarded with additional funding: Curtis V Cooper Health, Chatham County Police Department, and the Homeless Authority. Utilizing the remaining budget, the difference needed to successfully onboard all the hubs and complete reports is \$40,826.

Committee Recommendation:

- 1) Extending the project period and providing additional available funds to Savannah-Chatham County totaling: \$40,826. Staff plans to release a competitive announcement for the remaining (naloxone) funds on October 1, 2023 and will seek Committee approval of recommendations at the next meeting.

Adult Drug Court Discretionary Grant Program

Total Recommendation: \$60,000

Next, Mr. Thornton shared that the purpose of the FY2019 Adult Drug Court Discretionary Grant is to provide funding to eligible Accountability Courts for the purpose of providing Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), hiring Part-Time Case Managers, and expanding surveillance technology. In June of 2022, the Council approved the funding requests for eight continuation and implementation awards for the purpose of supporting additional MAT services. At the start of the year, CJCC staff reviewed the status of all remaining funds after voluntary de-obligations and closeouts. This resulted in a remaining balance of \$102,002 for supporting MAT services. Due to the limited nature of the funding, staff reached out to all remaining grantees in June of 2023 to determine the current needs to support work without disruption until December of 2023. Pickens County (Appalachian Judicial Circuit) advised that an additional \$60,000 would be needed to continue service through December 2023 as all current funds have been exhausted. The remaining courts have not requested additional funding but did mention a possible need at the start of 2024. Staff will be requesting a reallocation of funding from a separate grant category from the Bureau of Justice Assistance for additional MAT services to support the possible increase in need in 2024.

Committee Recommendation:

- 1) Through the partnership with the Council of Accountability Court Judges Funding Committee, the Committee recommends funding Pickens County (Appalachian Judicial Circuit) at \$60,000 and revisit if any additional support needed for the remaining courts at the start of 2024.

Law Enforcement Training Grant Program

Total Recommendation: \$1.25 million

Continuing, Mr. Thornton reported that CJCC was appropriated \$1.25 million for the FY 2024 Law Enforcement Training Grant Program, a decrease of \$6.25 million versus the amount received for FY 2023. CJCC will be prioritizing the continuation of the projects implemented by the Georgia Public Safety Training Center (GPSTC) related to training for de-escalation and school safety.

Committee Recommendation:

- 1) Awarding up to \$1.25 million to GPSTC for the continuation of de-escalation and school safety training programs. Any amounts not awarded to GPSTC may be utilized by CJCC for the continued administration of the grant program.

Grant Updates

At the conclusion of the presentation of the recommendations pertaining to the criminal justice awards, Mr. Thornton provided updates on the following grants:

Criminal Justice Strategic Plan

In August 2023, the Justice and Compliance Division hosted two stakeholder engagement meetings to assist in the development of the criminal justice strategic plan. Results from the January 2023 survey were shared with meeting participants, who were asked for feedback and additional insight as to the needs and priorities of the state's criminal justice system. A summary of both the survey results and meeting feedback will be shared at the full Council meeting scheduled for September 27, 2023, and members will be asked to review and provide additional insight and guidance. Once received, direction from CJCC's full Council will lead the drafting of the plan's strategic goals and objectives.

Project Safe Neighborhoods Grant Program (PSN)

Working in partnership with the United States Attorney's Office in the Northern, Middle, and Southern District, CJCC is tasked with managing the day-to-day duties of managing the PSN grant awards. As the fiscal agent, CJCC is barred from making any funding decisions as it relates to who receives allocations. It is the responsibility of each USAO to form a PSN Selection Committee to determine how funds are allocated.

Staff would like to inform the Council that on May 24, 2023, at the direction of the Northern District USAO, CJCC staff released the FY21/22 PSN Violence Reduction Microgrant Program Competitive RFP. The solicitation closed on June 23, 2023 and received 24 applications. Of the 24 applicants, the Northern District PSN Selection Committee selected 11 applications for funding. CJCC staff are now seeking federal approval from BJA prior to issuing subgrant awards.

The Southern District Selection Committee opted out of the competitive application process and selected four agencies for funding. Similarly, the Middle District's PSN Selection Committee also allocated funding to one agency. Each of the awards were awarded to local law enforcement agencies to support the reduction in violent and gang crime.

Juvenile Justice

Before presenting the recommendations pertaining to the juvenile justice funding recommendations, Mr. Thornton noted that the Juvenile Justice State Advisory Group (SAG) met on September 6, 2023, however, a quorum was not met. Although the SAG was unable to formally vote on the following requests, staff did present the following information to members.

FY20 Juvenile Delinquency and Prevention Grant Program Continuation

Total Recommendation: \$239,370

Mr. Thornton reported that in 2020, CJCC received the 2020 Juvenile Delinquency Prevention Grant (DP1) award of \$1,000,000 for Strengthening Families Program to service youth at-risk of entering the juvenile justice system. CJCC had funding to provide for six awards,

up to \$20,000 in the first year and 30,000 each year after, for five years. Priority consideration was given to rural communities. The project is currently in the fourth year of funding.

CJCC released the grant opportunity on June 28, 2023 and the opportunity was closed on August 4, 2023. CJCC received 6 applications requesting \$239,370. The total amount available to allocate is \$252,000.

FY21 Juvenile Delinquency and Prevention Grant Program Continuation/Competitive

Total Recommendation: \$295,177

Next, Mr. Thornton shared that in 2021, CJCC received the 2021 Juvenile Delinquency Prevention Grant (DP2) award of \$1,542,174 for local communities to implement evidence-based programs and prevention strategies to youth who are first time offenders, diverted from the juvenile justice system, or charged with a status offense and identified as at risk. The project is currently in the second year of funding.

CJCC released the grant opportunity on June 28, 2023 and the opportunity was closed on August 4, 2023. CJCC received 7 applications totaling \$295,177. The total amount available to allocate is \$330,000.

Juvenile Prevention and Intervention Grant Program Continuation/Competitive

Total Recommendation: \$1,036,215

Continuing, Mr. Thornton reported that the Juvenile Prevention and Intervention Grants Program provides funding for the implementation of programming for prevention from the juvenile justice system and intervention services for youth as alternatives to detention. Funding will support programming related to mental wellness, substance use, and violence reduction. Priority consideration will be given to applicants partnering with school systems to prevent and minimize substance use, violence, and support the mental health needs of children at-risk.

CJCC released the grant opportunity on June 28, 2023 and the opportunity was closed on August 4, 2023. CJCC received 39 applications requesting \$3,618,998. The total amount available to allocate is \$1,059,672. CJCC received 10 applications from government agencies and 29 applications from local non-profits. Per the RFP, CJCC expected to make at least 7 awards to local government agencies and 3 awards to local non-profits.

Staff recommendations were determined using following methodology and considering the amount of available funding. There are three readers for every application received. Applications were scored on administration, target population, needs statement, goals/objectives, methods and procedures, sustainability, previous accomplishments, and budget. Additionally, priority was given to continuing applications and applicants who collaborate with school systems to prevent and reduce violence, substance use, and address the mental health needs of at-risk kids. Scores ranged from as high as 90 to as low as 11.

At the conclusion of Mr. Thornton’s report, Chairman Hood turned to the Council for any questions. Hearing none, Ms. Fillingame was recognized and made a motion to accept the recommendations as presented. Ms. Bunn seconded the motion and it passed without dissent. Commissioner Oliver abstained from the vote pertaining to the RSAT awards due to a conflict of interest.

Grant Updates

Byrne JAG Strategic Plan

Next, Chairman Hood recognized Ms. Rachel Kilgore for the purpose of updating the Council on the Byrne JAG strategic planning process. Ms. Kilgore explained that she is currently in the data gathering phase of the project and presented the findings of a survey that was released to stakeholders across the state last December. The survey was shared with 19 unique stakeholder types and staff received just shy of 400 individual responses at a 64%

completion rate. 80% of the respondents were local law enforcement officers and the majority of those have been in their field for more than 10 years. Two stakeholder meetings were held in August and there were 37 total participants across the two meetings including virtual participants. In the meetings, staff walked through the survey results and asked for the input of the participants to be put into a general SWOT analysis. Staff worked with the National Criminal Justice Association (NCJA) and CJCC's internal statistical analysis center to put together the survey. The survey asked respondents to rank nine key issues on a scale from 1-10 with 10 being the most pressing. The following are the rankings given by the respondents:

- 1) Cyber crimes 4.1
- 2) HT/Identify Theft and Fraud 4.8
- 3) Incarceration of people with MI 5.1
- 4) Property Crime 5.2
- 5) School Safety 5.4
- 6) Intimate Partner Violence 5.6
- 7) Sexual Assault 6.3
- 8) Gang Activity 6.6
- 9) Drug Crimes 7.2

When asked if there were other major pressing issues not listed in this ranking, responses included: mental health in general; and gun violence; and homelessness. This list gives us a good perspective as to how these particular issues rank in relation each other and what our respondents are seeing on a regular basis.

Additionally, 87% of respondents said that violent crime has increased over the past 4 years. While the survey was limited on specific questions regarding this, when stakeholders were asked at the meetings, their feedback indicated that this finding is consistent with what they are witnessing in their respective fields. When going into detail about the increase in crime, it was reported that there are younger youth involved in youth related crime. This has contributed to the overall increase in crime. Furthermore, 80% reported that mental illness frequently or somewhat frequently affects violent crime in their area and 27% reported that the pandemic is still affecting crime in their area. Of those who said that it is affecting crime, the top aspects affected were delays in resolving court cases and mental illness involving crime.

Across the board, we asked respondents to rank the top three challenges that they were facing as they work to combat crime in their area. Overwhelmingly, workforce was ranked number one, followed closely by mental health, and then drug misuse and abuse.

Another topic on the survey was communication/coordination within and among agencies in the criminal justice system. The results of those who answered in the affirmative were fairly positive when referencing their own agency; however, their perspective on the communication/coordination of the criminal justice system as a whole were less positive with just under 40% answering in the affirmative. When asked how CJCC can assist with improving communication/coordination throughout the criminal justice system, respondents indicated that retention of law enforcement officers, improved training and communication through all levels of law enforcement, crime prevention strategies, and specific focus on youth crime prevention strategies were areas that could improve. The two major items that frequently came up in the meetings were youth prevention services and workload for law enforcement officers.

At the conclusion of her report, Ms. Kilgore turned to the Council for any input on the results of the survey and or any other items that should be considered when drafting the strategic plan. Chairman Hood thanked Ms. Kilgore and staff for their work on this data gathering project

and noted that he felt the ranking of the nine key issues was consistent with the allocations set forth in the Byrne JAG formula grants. He further noted that the issue regarding coordination throughout the criminal justice system is something that is being addressed through the multijurisdictional drug taskforces and the concerns regarding youth crime is being addressed through funding to prevention programs. Ms. Fillingame echoed Chairman Hood's comments noting that the ranking seemed accurate to the trends of crime in the state.

Ms. Kilgore concluded her report by asking Council members to reach out to her if they have any feedback regarding these results or other areas of interest that should be noted in the strategic plan.

Title II Formula Grant

Lastly, Mr. Thornton was recognized and shared that CJCC submitted the FY23 Title II Formula Grant on August 21st. We expect to be in full compliance. Additionally, staff has begun preparing for the strategic planning for Georgia's Juvenile 3 Year Plan as required per Title II. The Juvenile Justice State Advisory Group appointed five new members to the Equity and Justice for All Youth Subcommittee.

Old/New Business

Next, Chairman Hood recognized Mr. Thornton to share new business with the Council. Mr. Thornton reported to the members of the Council that the Equity and Justice for All Youth (EJAY) Subcommittee of the Juvenile Justice State Advisory Group (SAG) ensures Georgia's compliance with the Racial and Ethnic Disparities (R/ED) Core Requirement of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (JJDP). The EJAY Subcommittee has an ongoing technical assistance project that allows local governments to receive personalized data assistance at no cost to the applicant. Beginning 2021, the Subcommittee partnered with the Georgia Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) to provide hands on data analysis support. However, the staff at SAC managing this project have recently turned over creating a staff capacity issue. The Subcommittee and SAC have decided at this time it is best to find a new data analysis partner.

Members of the Subcommittee recently conducted interviews with three university professors as potential partners. Those individuals are:

- Dr. Bianca Channer, Kennesaw State University
- Dr. Vanessa Woodward Griffin, University of West Georgia
- Dr. Eric Sevigny, Georgia State University

The Subcommittee would like to submit Dr. Eric Sevigny as a recommendation to the Council for the EJAY technical assistance research partner. Dr. Sevigny will provide a personalized in-depth data analysis at the request of the county's juvenile justice agencies/organizations in an effort to reduce racial and ethnic disparities in their community. In addition, meetings will take place between the county and himself prior to the start of the analysis to outline the objectives of the project. There will be a minimum of three local governments for which technical assistance will be provided. Dr. Sevigny's Memorandum of Agreement will be for one year, October 1, 2023 until September 30, 2024 and will not exceed \$24,999 if approved.

At the conclusion of Mr. Thornton's report, Chairman Hood turned to the Council for any questions. Hearing none, Mr. Vignati was recognized and made a motion to accept the recommendation as presented. Commissioner Oliver seconded the motion and it passed without dissent.

Closing Remarks and Adjournment

At the conclusion of the new and old business, Chairman Hood thanked CJCC staff for all of their work on the recommendations. Chairman Hood recognized Director Neal who presented a commendation from Governor Kemp to Ms. Sonja Fillingame for her work as the previous chair of the Council.

At the conclusion of Director Neal's presentation of the commendations, Chairman Hood recognized Commissioner Oliver who made a motion to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned at 3:05 p.m.
