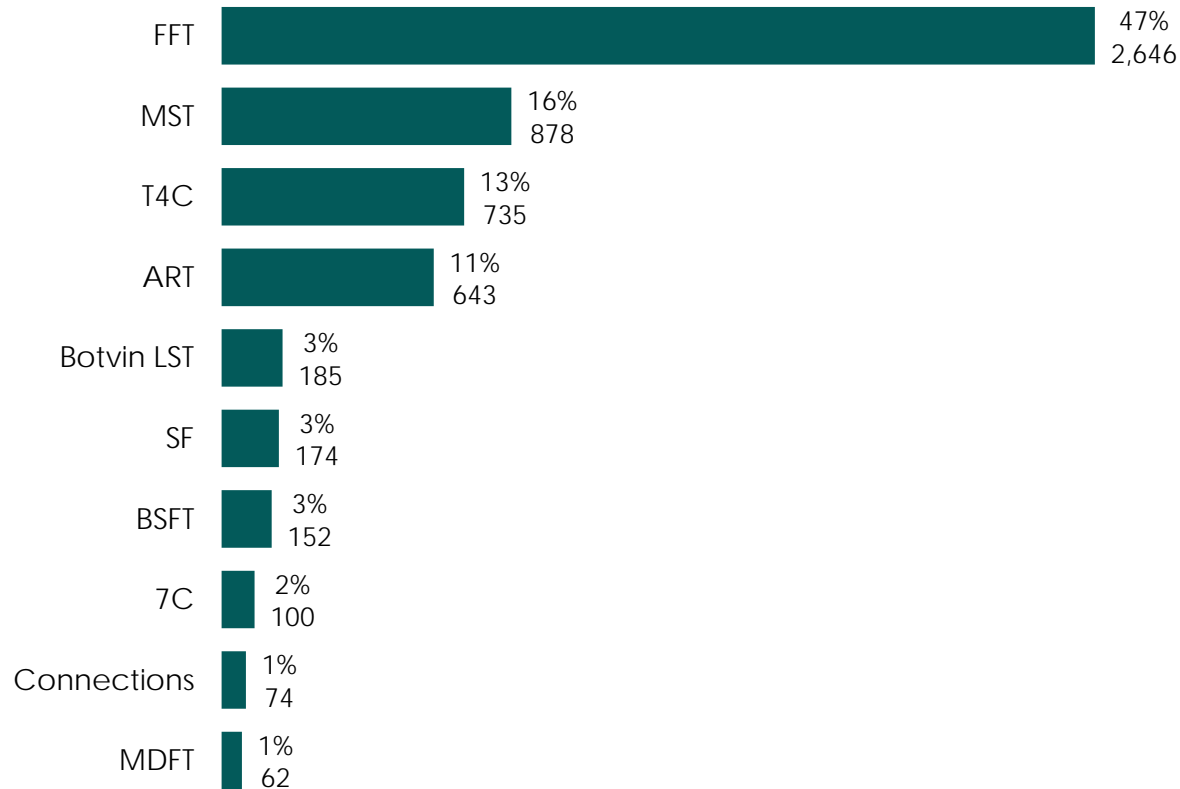

EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAM OUTCOMES

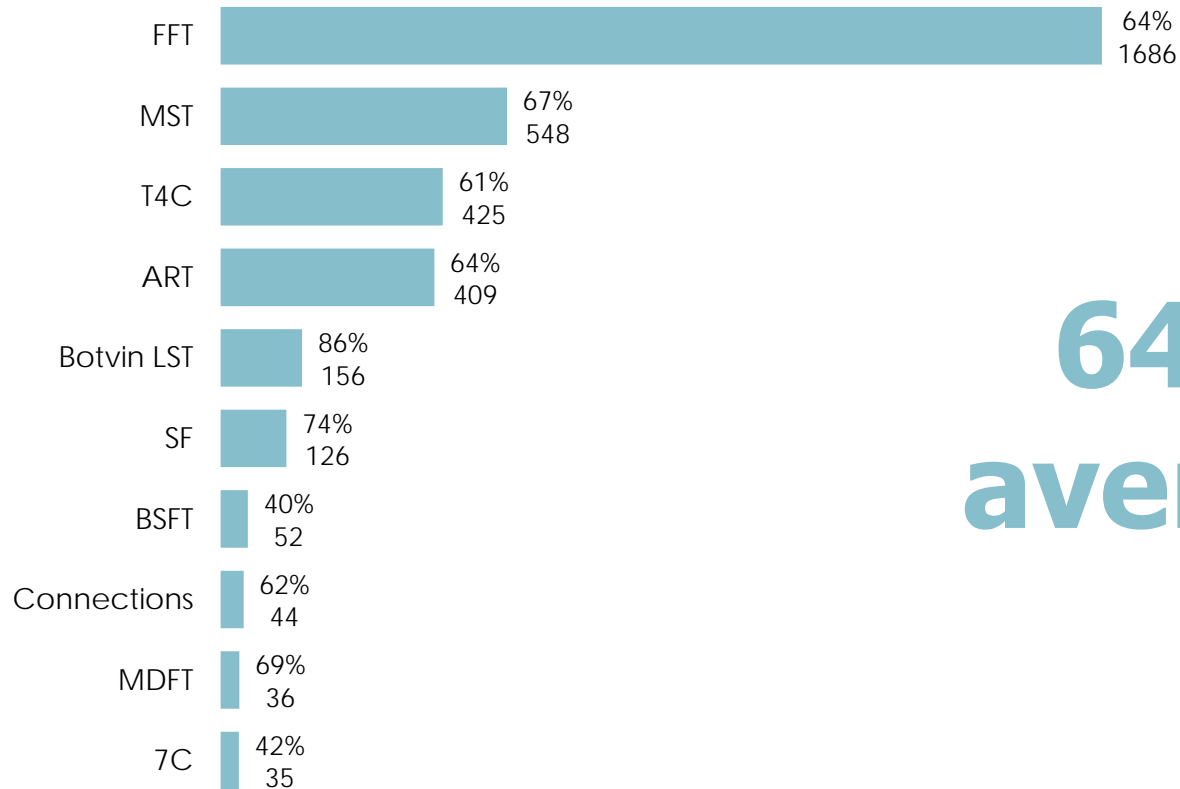

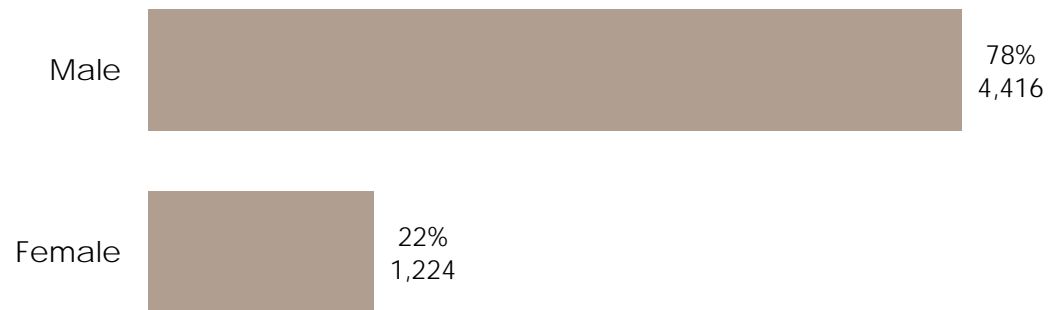

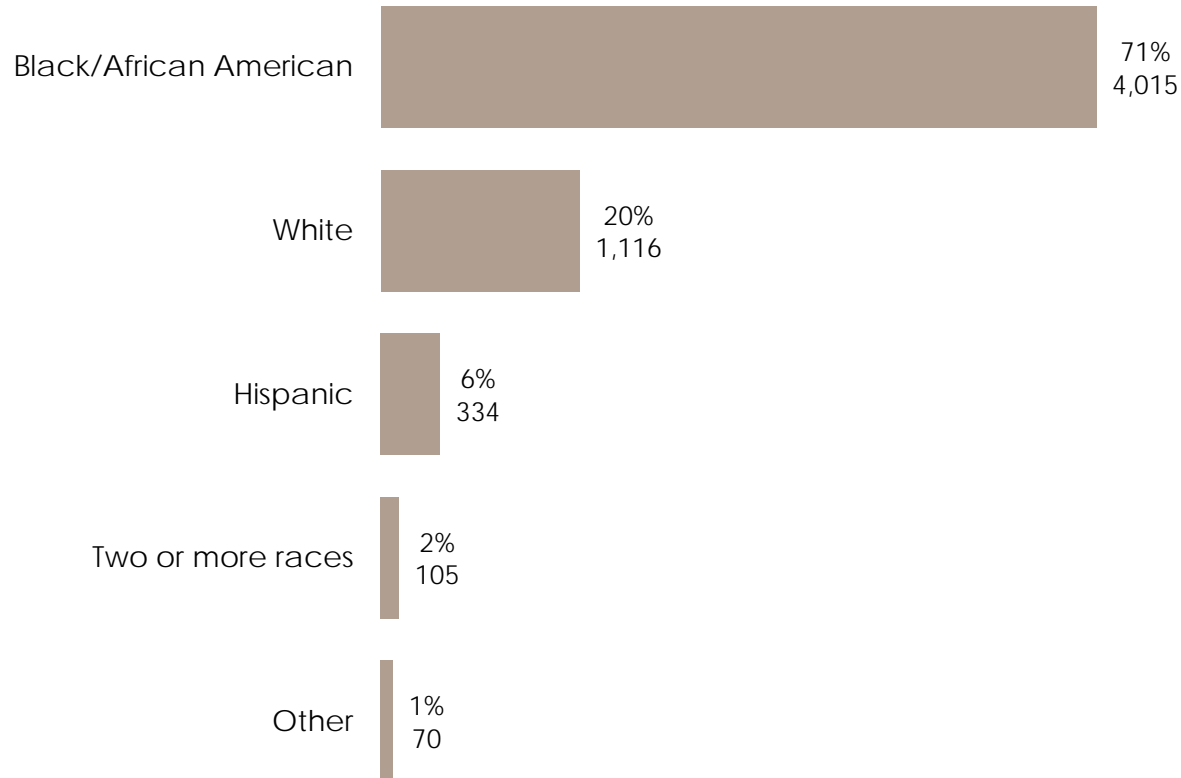
Males comprised 78% and females comprised 22% of youth served in grant-funded programs.

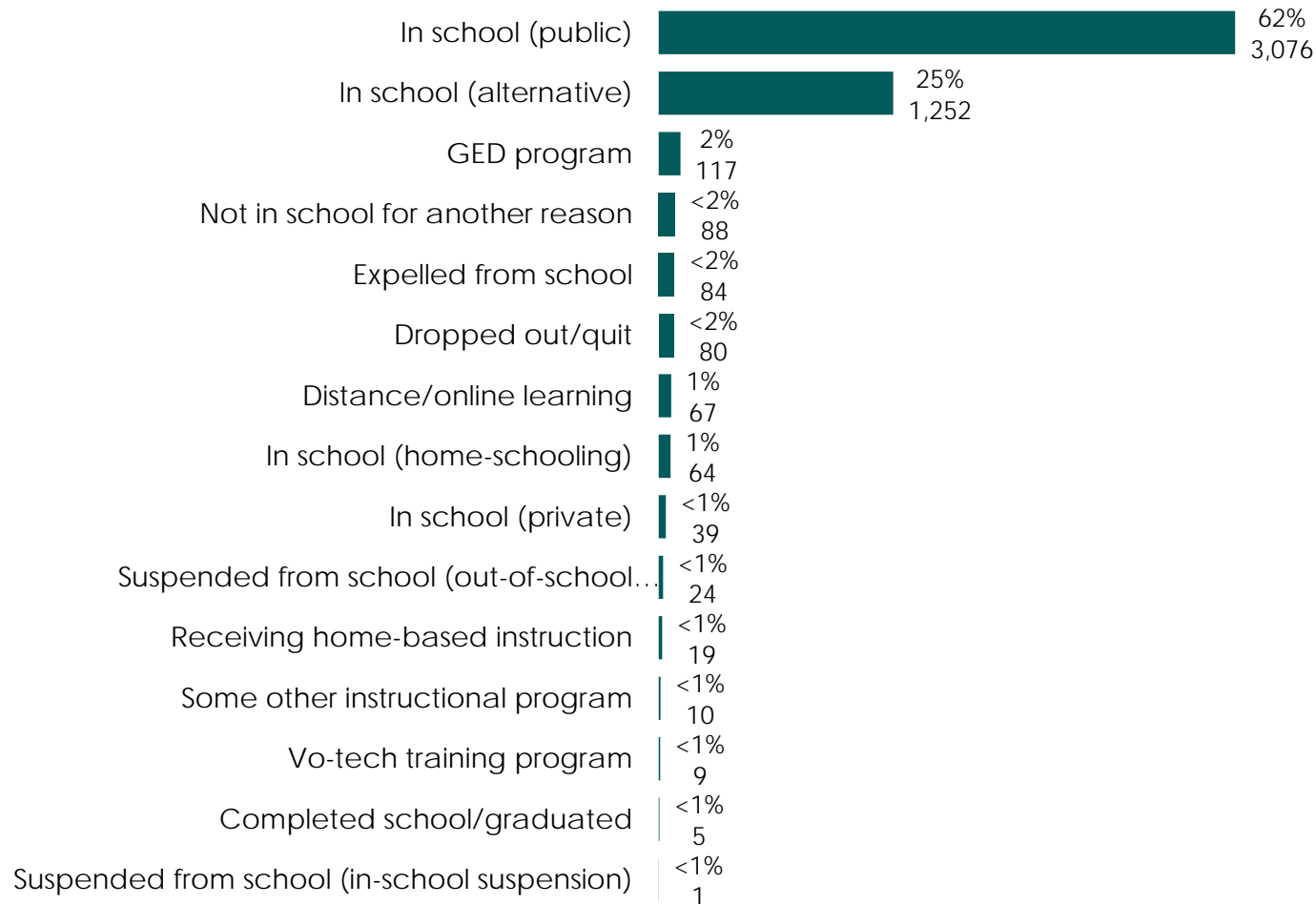
Evidence-based program participants identified as Black/African American (71%), White (20%), Hispanic (6%), two or more races (2%), and other (1%).

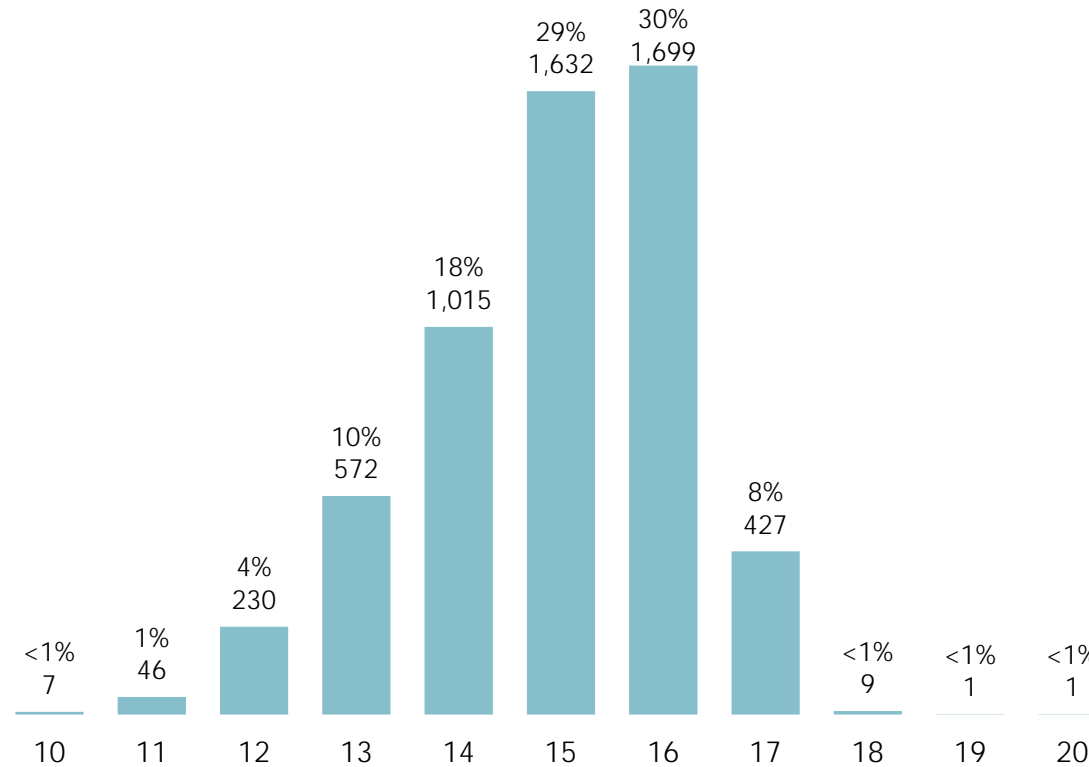
Approximately 95% of program participants were enrolled in or had completed some type of educational programming.

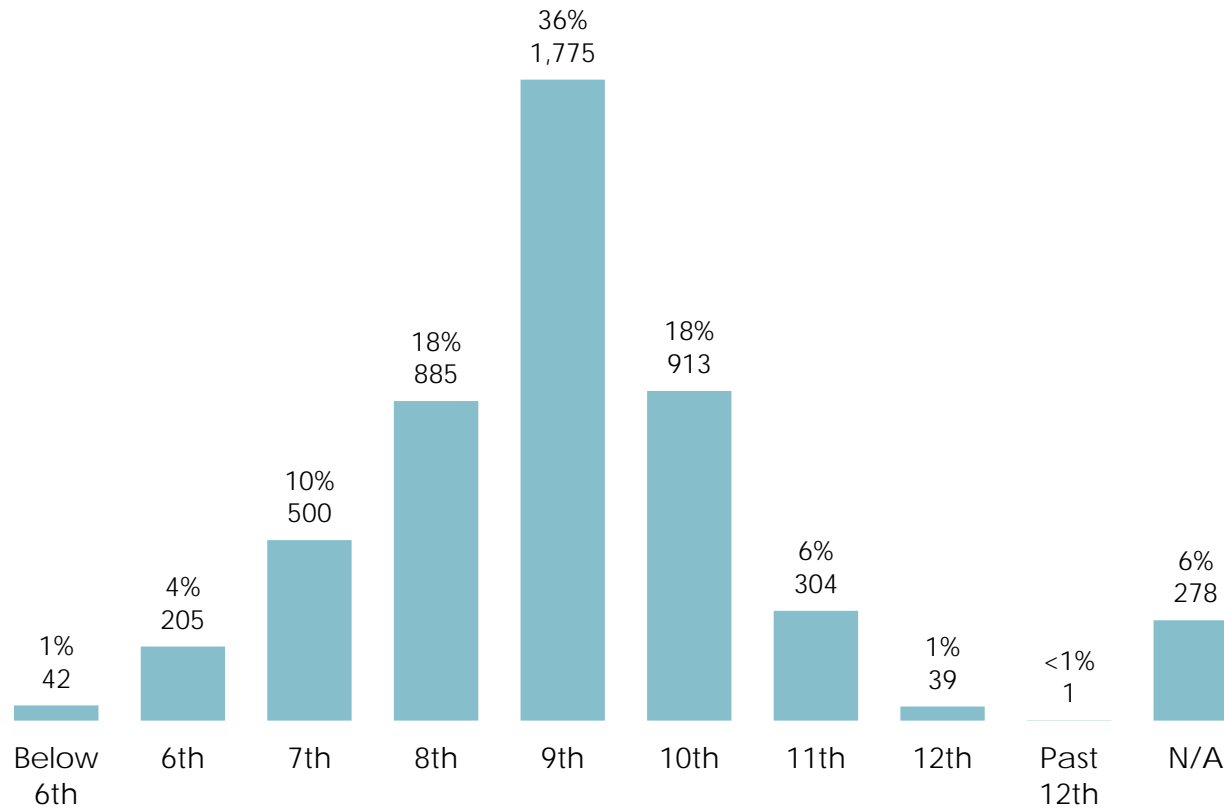
At the time of first enrollment, the majority of youth were between ages 14 and 16.

PRE-DISPOSITION RISK ASSESSMENT



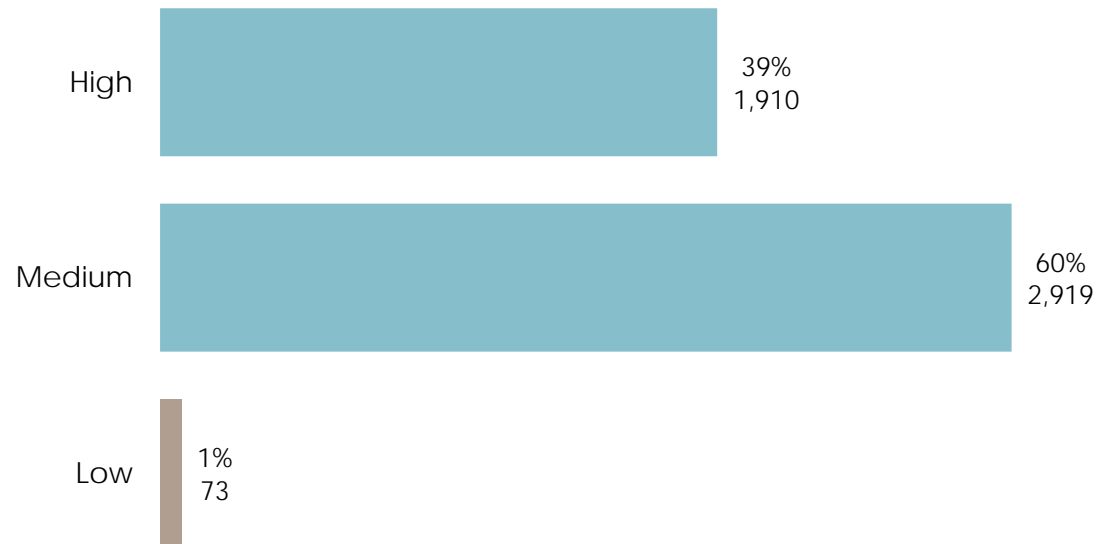

Only 1% of evidence-based program participants (73 participants) served were reported to have a low Pre-Disposition Risk Assessment score.

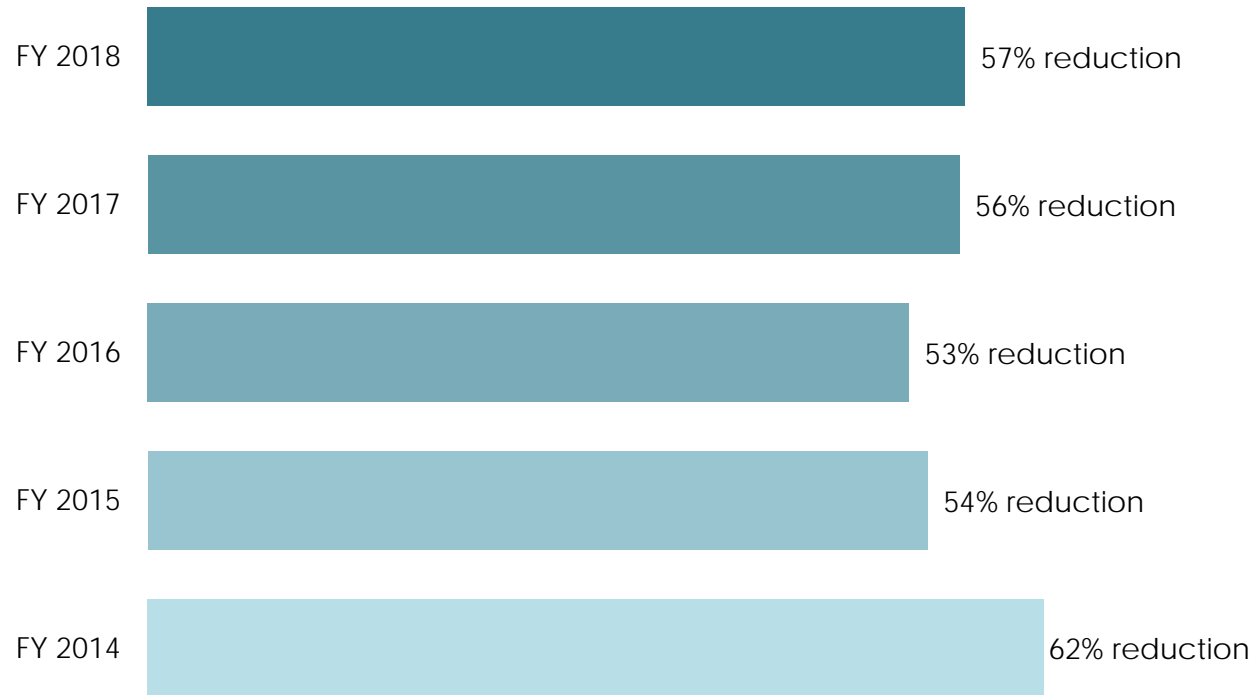

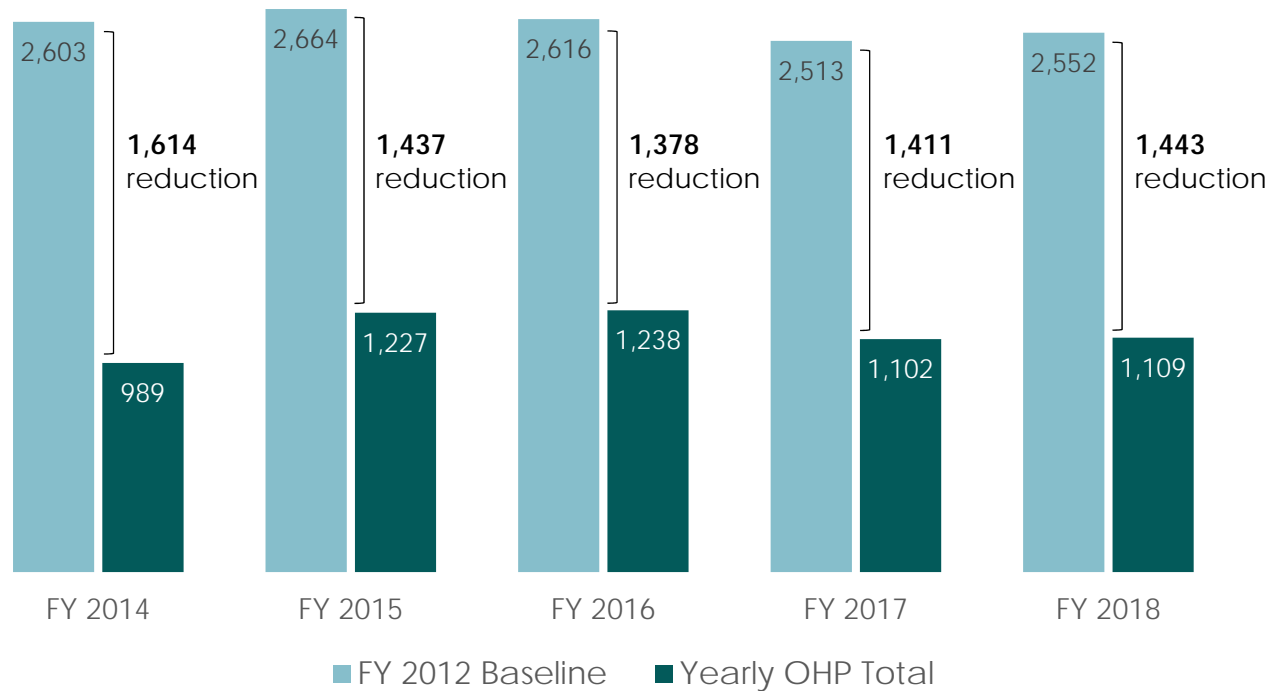
Compared to the 2012 baseline, average annual out-of-home placement reductions across all grantees ranged from 53% to 62%.

Compared to the 2012 baseline, there was on average 1,457 fewer annual out-of-home placements each year.

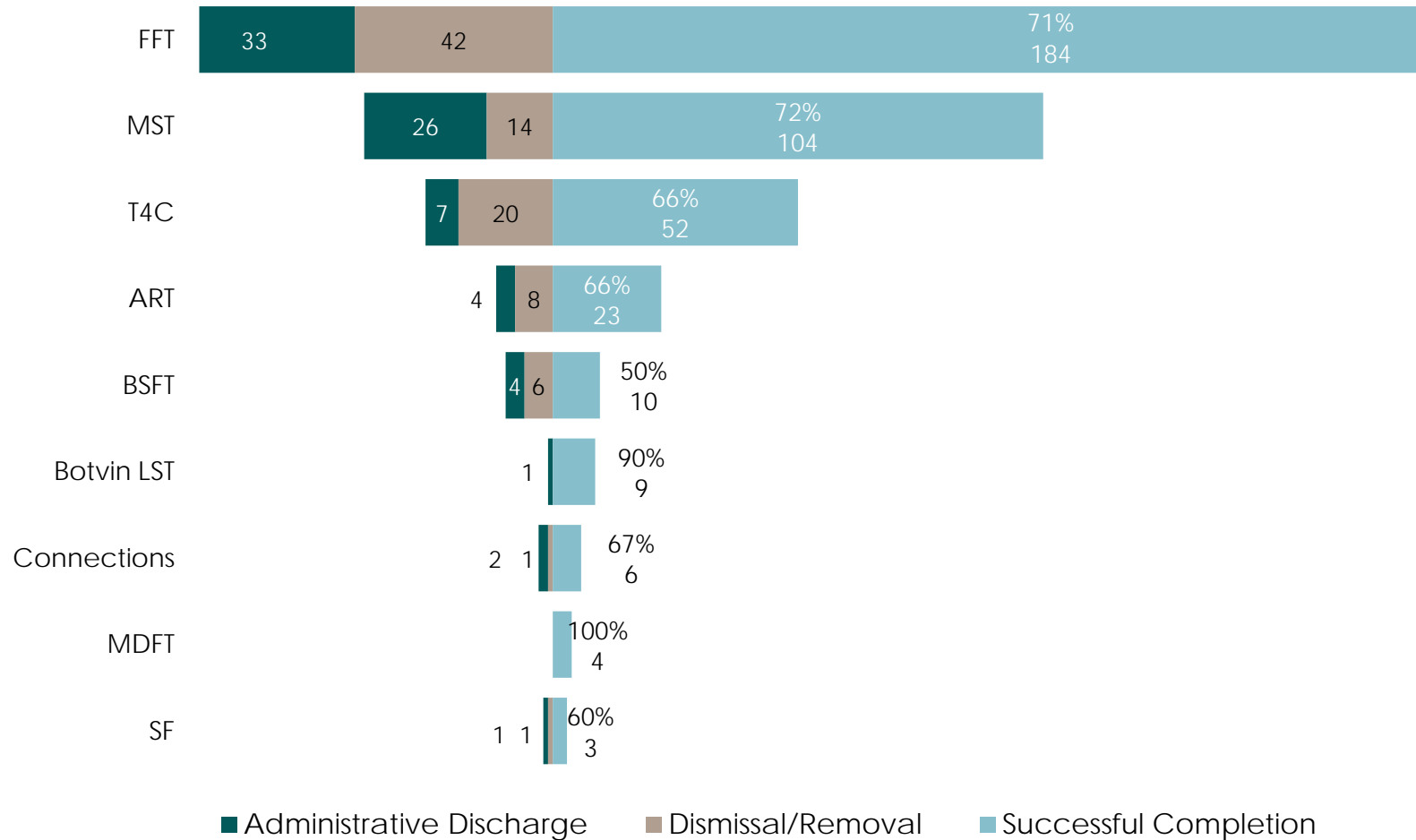

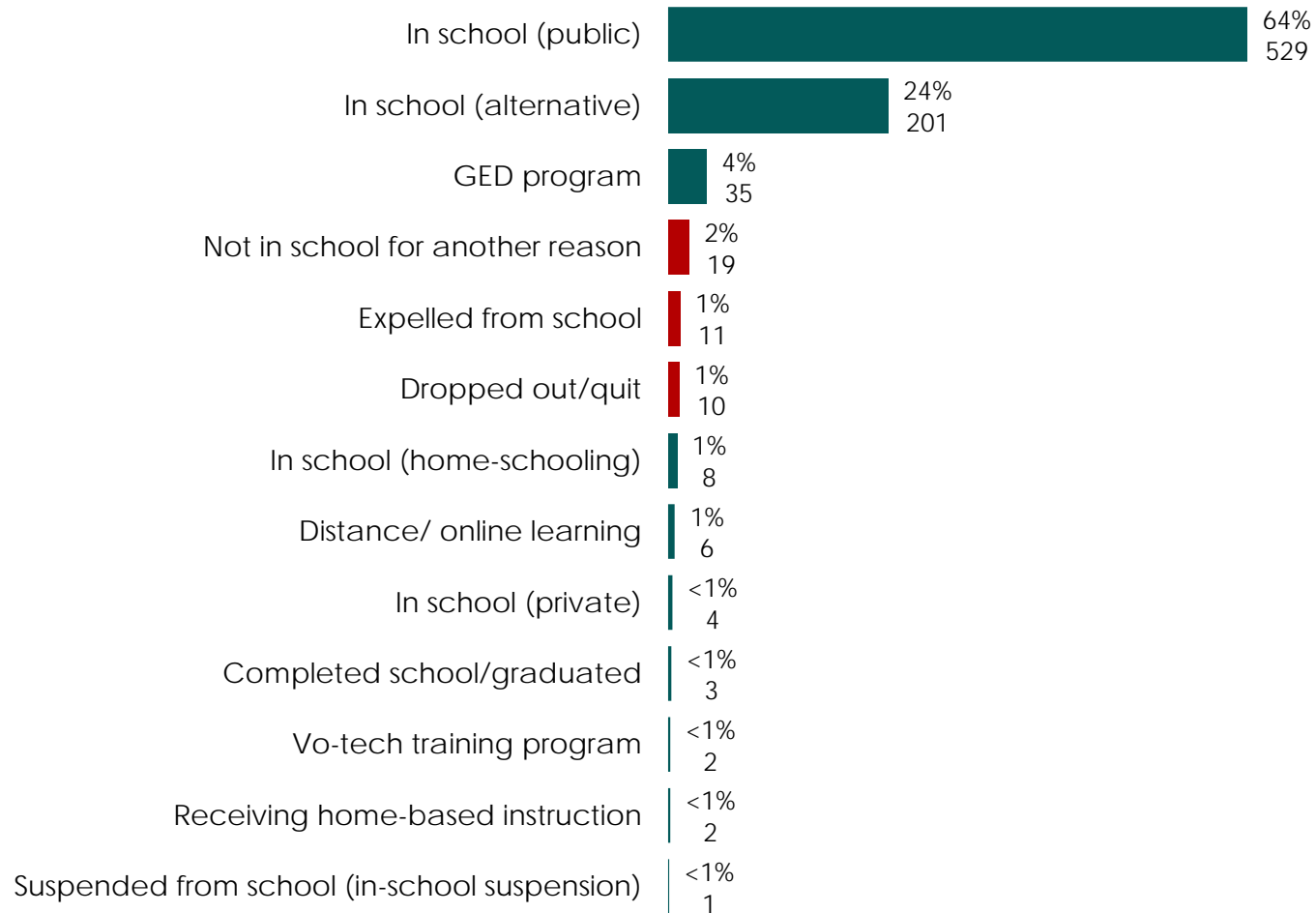
Seven of the nine evidence-based programs reported successful completion rates at or above 65%.

PRE-DISPOSITION RISK ASSESSMENT

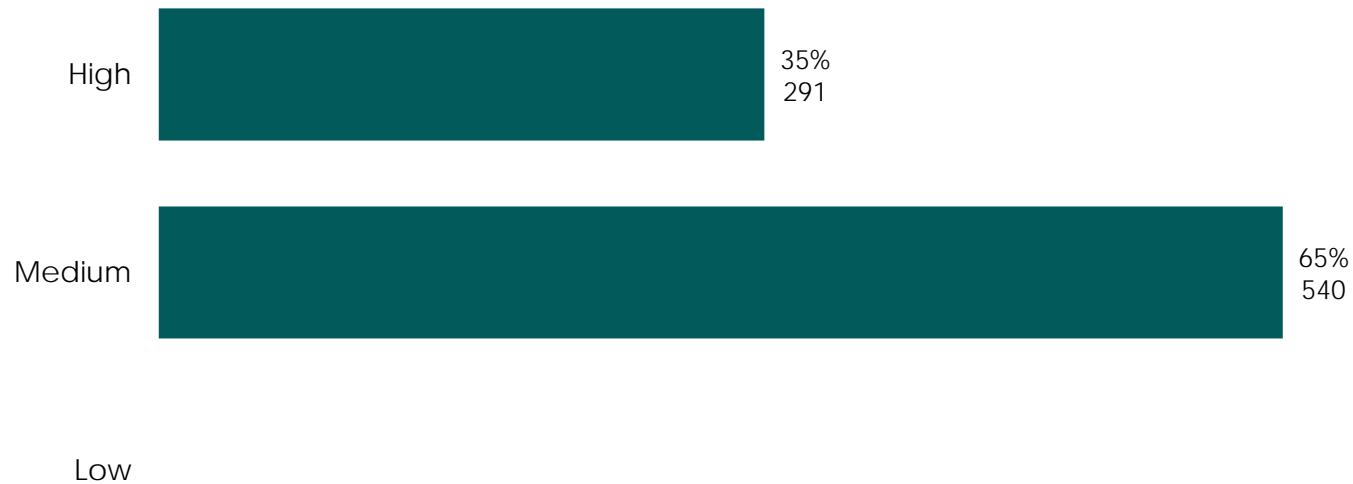

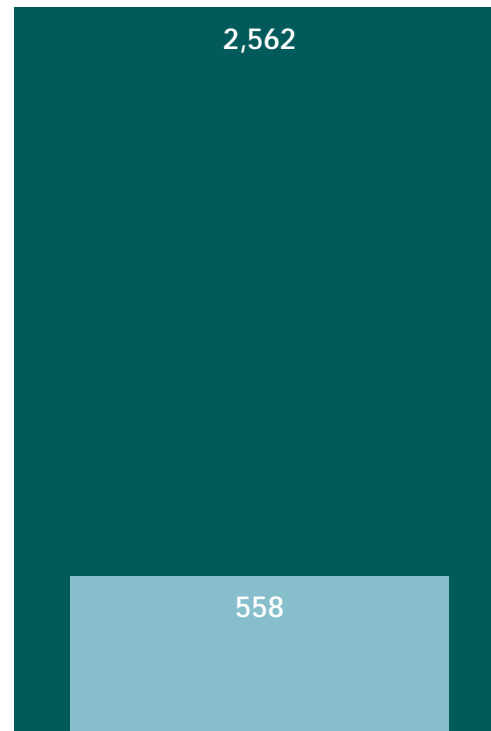
