1 CREATION OF COMMISSION

The Judicial, District Attorney, and Circuit Public Defender Compensation Commission (the "Commission") was statutorily created during the 2015 Legislative Session with the passage of HB279 and the subsequent approval of Governor Deal on May 6, 2015. As described in more detail below, the purpose of the Commission is to (i) review issues related to the efficient use of the justice system's resources and caseload balance, (ii) review all aspects of compensation paid to justices, judges, district attorneys, and circuit public defenders, and (iii) recommend action or proposed legislation the Commission deems necessary or appropriate.

2 MEMBERSHIP OF COMMISSION

The Commission consists of five members.

- The Governor appointed two members, Gus Makris and Johnny Gresham. The law requires that one of the Governor's appointees be a non-lawyer who has experience in executive compensation.
 Mr. Gresham satisfied those requirements.
- The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court appointed one member, Presiding Justice P. Harris Hines.

 The law requires that this appointee be a current or retired judge or justice in this state. Justice Hines satisfied that requirement.
- The Lieutenant Governor appointed one member, Charlotte Nash. The law requires that this appointee be a non-lawyer. Ms. Nash satisfied that requirement.
- The Speaker of the House of Representatives appointed one member, Representative Richard Smith. The law requires that this appointee be a non-lawyer. Representative Smith satisfied that requirement.
- The law provides that the chairperson of the Senate Appropriations Committee and the chairperson of the House Committee on Appropriations serve as ex-officio, nonvoting members of the Commission.

Each member of the Commission has been appointed to serve a term of four years or until his or her successor is appointed. The Governor designated Gus Makris to serve as the chairperson of the Commission.

The Commission is attached for administrative purposes only to the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, which will provide staff to support the work of the Commission.

3 CHARGE OF COMMISSION

The Commission is statutorily charged to:

• To review the conditions, needs, issues, and problems related to the efficient use of resources and caseload balance of the justice system in this state and the compensation paid to justices, judges, district attorneys, and circuit public defenders; issue a report on the same to the executive counsel of the Governor, the Office of Planning and Budget, and the chairpersons of the House Committee on Appropriations, the Senate Appropriations Committee, the House Committee on Judiciary, and the Senate Judiciary Committee; and recommend any action or proposed legislation which the Commission deems necessary or appropriate. Nothing contained in the Commission's report shall be considered to authorize or require a change in any law without action by the General Assembly. The Commission is required to submit its first report on or before December 15, 2015, its second report on or before December 15, 2016, and thereafter at least every two years; and

• To evaluate and consider:

- Whether the compensation structure of this state is adequate to ensure that the most highly qualified attorneys in this state, drawn from diverse life and professional experiences, are not deterred from serving or continuing to serve in the state judiciary, as district attorneys, and as circuit public defenders and do not become demoralized during service because of compensation levels;
- The compensation paid as a county supplement to judges, district attorneys, circuit public defenders, and other staff associated with the courts;
- The caseload demands of judicial officers, prosecuting attorneys, and public defenders and the allocation of such officials, including staffing resources and jurisdictional structure;
- The skill and experience required of the particular judgeships or attorney positions at issue;
- The time required of the particular judgeships or attorney positions at issue;
- The value of compensable service performed by justices and judges, district attorneys, and circuit public defenders as determined by reference to compensation in other states and the federal government;

- The value of comparable service performed in the private sector, including private judging, arbitration, and mediation, based on the responsibility and discretion required in the particular judgeship at issue and the demand for those services in the private sector;
- The compensation of attorneys in the private sector;
- o The Consumer Price Index and changes in such index;
- o The overall compensation presently received by other public officials and employees; and
- Any other factors that are normally or traditionally taken into consideration in the determination of compensation.

4 STRATEGY OF COMMISSION

The Commission met on December 2 for organizational and planning purposes. The Chairman called the meeting to order, welcomed the Members, and facilitated introductions of Members, staff, and guests before highlighting the Statutory Creation, Membership, and Charge of the Commission. Following robust discussion, the Commission adopted a timeline for 2016 and outlined its strategy for identifying priorities and fulfilling its statutory charge.

The Commission will meet again January 11, 2016. This meeting will provide an opportunity for the Commission to (i) receive presentations from Stakeholders, including the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Council of Superior Court Judges, the Prosecuting Attorney's Council, and the Public Defenders Council, (ii) discuss the Commission's Legislative Charge and establish priorities for 2016, and (iii) appoint committees to begin the process of addressing the Commission's priorities.
