
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
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- Refers to the disproportionate number of minority youth who come into contact with the juvenile justice system.
- Youth of color are over-represented in the juvenile justice system.
 - In 2011, Black youth were 4.6 times more likely to be incarcerated than White youth. Latinos were 1.8 times more likely than White youth.
- Racial and Ethnic Disparity (RED) has replaced DMC
- Georgia DMC



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Georgia Findings

Effective Student Discipline: Keeping Kids in Class, Georgia Appleseed Center for Law & Justice (June 2011)

- In school year 2009-10, 8.1% of students in K-12 public school received at least 1 OSS.
- GA ranked 10th highest among all states and D.C. in the rate of OSS discipline (2005-06 data).
- Use of exclusionary discipline is highly variable among school districts in GA.
- OSS rates and graduation rates are negatively correlated.
- The vast majority of OSS actions were taken for nonviolent actions.


Georgia Findings: Intersectionality

Effective Student Discipline: Keeping Kids in Class, Georgia Appleseed Center for Law & Justice (June 2011)

- African-American students are consistently more than 3x as likely to receive an OSS than students of other races.
- Students eligible for FRM and ELL students are subject to OSS at a rate more than 2x that of students who were not in these subgroups.
- Special Needs Students receive OSS at a rate slightly higher than 1.5x the rate experienced by General Education students.


