Sexual Assault on Campus: A Trauma Informed Response

A 2-day Training for Law Enforcement, Title IX Coordinators and/or Title IX Investigators

A trauma informed response to sexual assault is a best practice for police and public safety agencies and the use of a trauma informed response is becoming increasingly prevalent with agencies across the country. This training, "Sexual Assault on Campus: A Trauma Informed Response," will benefit personnel from sworn and non-sworn agencies of all sizes. Whether a first responding officer on the scene, the dispatcher that takes the initial call, or a seasoned investigator, a trauma informed response can help retrieve better, more consistent information from the victim, while also limiting the re-traumatization that can occur during a sexual assault investigation.

IACLEA trainers, Josh Bronson and Jim Markey will address (1) the realities of sexual assault for victims and offenders, (2) the science of trauma and how it impacts victims, (3) how to obtain information from victims who may be experiencing the effects of trauma, (4) investigative strategies, including a discussion of consent, the use of alcohol and other drugs that are used to facilitate sexual assault, and (5) Title IX and how to work more effectively with campus and local partners.

Senior Forensic Scientist of the Scientific Analysis Section of the FBI Laboratory, Dr. Marc LeBeau will discuss the crime of alcohol and drug facilitated sexual assault (AFSA/DFSA) and its impact on victims, law enforcement, toxicology laboratories, and society. The challenges of this crime include drugs used, reporting of the crime, proper evidence collection, and the toxicological analyses of specimens. The challenge associated with strong, central nervous system depressants used to commit DFSA emphasizes their pharmacological effects and how these drugs create difficulties in the investigation.
